Since the war in Ukraine, the European Union's weaknesses have become clear. Its Member States often struggle to take a unified, coordinated stance. While they are formally united by common values, this moral harmony has frequently translated into decision-making paralysis, weakening our international credibility and delaying humanitarian responses. We have become a chessboard on which others play, exposing our indecision.

The root of this problem is cultural: it is necessary to shape a European popular identity, built through spaces where people can meet, confront ideas, and develop joint proposals. A people's identity grows through dialogue, diversities, and the shared desire to shape the future.

Out of this awareness, the **European Youth Movement** emerges, not to impose a priori solutions, but to give new generations the possibility to build a common and coordinated European political line.

We unite the young people of Europe, regardless of their political positions, united by the will to find common answers together, through reasoned debate and the construction of a popular network of personal knowledge.

This process of aggregation triggers a virtuous circle: it strengthens quality information, founded on attention to content and on shared enthusiasm for active participation. Every form of common confrontation must indeed be backed by in-depth individual research. Transparency, critical analysis, and intellectual rigor are essential tools to elevate the quality of debates and, consequently, to assert the practical credibility of our proposals.

The objectives of the E.Y.M. can therefore be summarized in two points:

- **Shaping identity through the community**  
By getting to know one another and embracing different realities, we can truly feel like European citizens and by following a shared political path, we create the conditions to act together.
- **Debate to propose**  
Social, cultural, and political differences are not obstacles—they are the foundation for debate, for building common political positions, and for turning these positions into concrete political action that unites vision with respect for diversity.

The European Youth Movement is born as an act of political and cultural responsibility. United, we build a shared European consciousness and transform it into action.
